The team work directly with students to support brief intervention and establish supports within school as well as supporting access to external services to ensure all our students can thrive. The team focus on: Overseeing health and wellbeing of all students attending the wellbeing centre. Providing counselling, support and mediation for students and their families, including behaviour management plans, social and organisational skills. Extra-Curricular Items and Activities

Monbulk College offers a range of items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis via compass events. Activities include Excursions, Incursions, Swimming, Camps, Sporting etc. All events will be managed through the Compass portal. A notification will be sent to parents at the time of the event. CSEF is available to qualifying families or the School Saving Bonus if families chose to allocate an amount for activities on the portal. Families with remaining School Saving Bonus amounts will continue to be able to access these funds to support students with Extra-Curricular Items and Activities until fully depleted.

Financial Support for Families

Monbulk College makes every effort to ensure parent payments are affordable to all parents. Monbulk College understands that some families may experience financial difficulty. We have a range of support options including payment plans, a family support fund, Camps, Sports, and Excursions Fund (CSEF) and access to States Schools' Relief. Payments for all Curriculum Contributions and Other Contributions can be made either in full or 5 equal monthly instalments using Compass Course Confirmation and Payments.

- 1. Open Course Confirmation and Payments and select the payments that you would like to make.
- 2. Either pay in full or <u>via 10 fortnightly instalments</u> (commencing 27/11/2025) in Compass Course Confirmation.
- 3. Complete payment using your Debit/Credit Card details and submit.

Refunds

FREE INSTRUCTION

- Schools provide students with free instruction and ensure students have free access to all items, activities and services that are used by the school to fulfil the requirements of the Curriculum. This includes the Victorian Curriculum F-10, the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) including the VCE Vocational Major and the Victorian Pathways Certificate.
- Schools may invite parents to make a financial contribution to support the school.

PARENT PAYMENT REQUESTS

Schools can request contributions from parents under three categories:



Curriculum Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for curriculum items and activities which the school deems necessary for students to learn the Curriculum.

Other Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for non-curriculum items and activities that relate to the school's functions and objectives.

Extra-Curricular Items and Activities

Items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides for free to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis.

• Schools may also invite parents to supply or purchase educational items to use and own (e.g. textbooks, stationery, digital devices).



FINANCIAL HELP FOR FAMILIES

- Schools put in place financial hardship arrangements to support families who cannot pay for items or activities so that their child doesn't miss out.
- Schools have a nominated parent payment contact person(s) that parents can have a confidential discussion with regarding financial hardship arrangements.



SCHOOL PROCESSES

 Schools must obtain school council approval for their parent payment arrangements and publish all requests and communications for each year level on their school website for transparency.
